The High Plains Western Heritage is pleased to announce the hiring of Scott Gambino as its new Curator. Gambino comes to the HPWHC from Casper, Wyoming. He graduated from the University of Wyoming with major in history and a minor in museum studies. Gambino also attended Casper College with an Associates of Arts degree in Museum studies and history.

"Scott has really hit the ground running, working with our volunteers, getting to know our displays, and our system of record keeping," said Karla Scovell, HPWHC Executive Director. "I'm really impressed with his love for the history represented here and how he dove right in to getting to know the people and the area."

Gambino's job responsibilities will include developing museum displays, using his extensive

middle school. Then in college, he did an internship at Ft. Casper and the Veterans Museum in Casper. "They really just took me under their wing." It was during that time that he developed a special interest in the work that goes on behind the scenes.

"At any museum there are exhibits. But what happens to make an exhibit come to life is what I'm passionate about," Gambino said. "There's the research and then the putting of the information into a database. This helps to find a cohesive set of artifacts that can be put together to make an exhibit that makes sense. I really love that."

Scott's first job out of college was working for the newly-created National Park Service at the Quebec-one Missile Alert Facility State Historical Site north of Cheyenne. He did the initial set up of the exhibits for the site. Following that prior to coming to HPWHC, Gambino worked at the National Museum of Military Vehicles in DuBoise, Wy.

Since coming to Spearfish in mid-April Gambino has enjoyed meeting the volunteers and getting to know the museum and the rich history of the five-state Black Hills region. "It's so beautiful here and to be able to be a proper steward of the history here is amazing," he said.

For Gambino, history in its most basic form, is the telling of stories through artifacts and preserving them for future generations. "I see museums kind of like libraries," he said. "They are a pillar of education in the community. A place where people can come and learn."

This month the HPWHC will see a record number of school children from across the region visiting the Center on schoolyear ending field trips. He is espe-

cially looking forward to that.


